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

- Membership drive: Calling tree to be created whereby each executive committee member will call 20 -30 dermatologists to get them to enrol into BDS. The motion was passed.
- Mr. Basavaraje Gowda's salary to be increased by 8% annually. As it wasn't
 increased during the last term, a 16% increase from. The current term to be
 considered. He will also be gifted a watch if the AGBM approved. The
 motion was passed.
- Dr. Shashikiran AR updated about the Bus Awareness program wherein 10 BMTC & 40 KSRTC buses are now carrying posters to create awareness on whom to consult for skin disorders. Bus registration numbers & the photos of posters on the busses have been shared for confirmation. QR code on these posters will direct to www.iadvl.org It was suggested to consider similar advertisement in Metro stations where the public footfall is good. Another suggestion was to use single line posters for more easy knowledge transfer. The motion was passed.
- To use Social Media (YouTube,Facebook, Instagram) for more public awareness. AGBM agreed in principal but suggested EC to plan for social media use depending on the success of the bus awareness program. The motion was passed.
- Anti-quackery measurers by BDS: Legal way forward has to be planned Advertisements can be put across to create more awareness in public. Advertisements can be displayed on movie theatre screens. AGBM suggested to form a committee and to meet Health Department Officials to further anti quackery measurers. The motion was passed.

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A Vitiligo patients marriage register is being maintained by Maya Foundation, permission to circulate the same to all BDS members was seeked. The motion was passed.

A token of appreciation along with a standing ovation to outgoing President Dr. Nandini AS was given by the AGBM.








Social / Cultural activities for the members

 The Minister & the Officer in charge were very receptive & assured that necessary measures will be initiated.





Inspiring Dermatologist

Dr. Venkataram Mysore,
MBBS. DVD. DNB. M.D. Dip RCPath (LOND)
FRCP (Glasgow) FISHRS

Dr. Venkataram Mysore is one of the foremost dermatologists in India and the world. He is a unique combination of dermatologist, dermatopathologist and hair transplant surgeon, with over 30 years of experience in different countries. He started his career in India, where he also served in the Indian Air Force. He then went abroad for further experience and established himself first in Muscat, then in Bahrain. Venkat center offers fellowship program post MD/DNB Dermatology. He was President of DASIL,2019 and now Board member of ILDS education committee, WHO. He served as a President of three Premier Indian Associations - ACSI (2010), AHRS (2013), IADVL (2015) and helped in developing many International Associations.

1. Sir please tell us about your childhood and college days?

Childhood was mostly in Mysore. All those people who join MBBS were good in studies I too was good, but I want to mention here that I studied in Kannada medium. That is important to note so till 8th standard it was Kannada only English picked up once I joined MBBS. For those who think that Kannada is a disadvantage I can say that I would not agree. School and college in Mysore was at Marimallappa's high school. MBBS was Mysore medical college, Diploma and MD was also in Mysore medical college. While doing DVD and MD I went to different places for training. I went to CMC Vellore then Karigiri institute for leprosy, P L Behl institute in Delhi for surgery etc. I'm one of those very few doctors who did DNB first and then MD. I had done diploma and then joined MD. I had already passed part 1 so in the 1st year of my MD I had taken DNB so by the time I came to MD exam I already had 1 year post DNB experience. and so, I was extremely confident by the time of MD examination. I had joined Indian Air Force as a medical officer between 1981 to 1996 and that experience is invaluable and has shaped me the way I do things punctuality, discipline, adherent to rules etc from that experience. I also had administrative experience of not just medical part but also things like accounting, running a mess, running a canteen, even a poultry etc. so I have never thought that doctor should not become administrators and they should become administrators.

2. Sir what inspired you to take up dermatology?

I can't say I was inspired by anybody or anything. Dermatology was a low-key subject in those days what used to be called -sit and read dermatology or arm chair dermatology, hardly any drugs, hardly any methods of investigations so there was nothing inspiring as we joined. Partly I joined out of compulsion. I wanted to do medicine but as circumstances conspired, I could get only dermatology.

3. Can you share your experience working with Indian air force?

Most important things I had learnt in Airforce was to deal confidently with any situation and with people. I was thrust into situations where I have to handle very senior officers who came on



inspection and that gave me confidence to deal with anybody. so, post that learning, I never felt difficulty in talking to a senior or talking to anybody. When you work in Indian Airforce confidence will grew up leap and bounds that I can handle any situation, army prepares you for it. You are supposed to handle everything independently and complete the job. My senior commanding officer used to say your work is to complete the job- go complete the job; beg, borrow, steal but do the job if u get caught while doing these, I will defend u. So doing the job is very important, doing it correctly and completely is very important.

4. Sir can you share how you developed your multitasking skills over the course of your career?

Incidentally I did DVD while I was in Airforce so morning 7:30 am I would go to Airforce, work till 9 o clock then come to the hospital in Mysore, KR hospital attend the clinic from 9 am to 12 pm. 12 o clock go back work till 2pm and then have lunch. After lunch, come back to the hospital, attend the teaching program, evening go to the library and then go home. That means my day was 12 hrs and I was doing 2-3 times 2-3 things at a time. working in Airforce, doing the administration, studying and work in the hospital. This became a kind of a set pattern for the rest of my life.

5. You are a Dermatopathologist and Dermatosurgeon which is a very rare combination. How did you develop passion towards both sir?

After my MD I went to America for a 6 weeks course and then moved to Muscat and there we had an excellent pathology department in the university with immunofluorescence, electron microscopy everything was available that rekindled my interest in pathology. During those days immunology was growing up well so I got interested in immunology that translated into pathology. Dermatosurgery became my interest as I was not satisfied with the amount of academic work, I was doing so I was always looking for something else and that is how I found Dr Behl. I went to Dr Behl's place in Delhi. Behl was a pioneer in Dermatosurgery. I spent a few months with him and I learnt Dermatosurgery at that time and when I came back, I joined my MD and my thesis was on skin tumours so I used to assist a plastic surgeon and that is how my interest in Dermatosurgery grew up and because I was interested into analysis, pathology became my passion. That is how my interest in Dermatosurgery grew at the same time.

6. What was your experience of learning Dermatopathology in Royal College of Pathology, UK?

In 1993 there was an announcement by Royal college of pathology that they are starting a course in Dermatopathology. so, I took it up and there from 7:30 am to 2 pm I would work in the department then I would drive about 40 kms having lunch on the way to another hospital which was better for conventionalised pathology report on the slides and come back by 6 o clock. This went on and I became very good in theory so passed out in first attempt in 1994 but practical examination I was still not confident about cancers so I did not pass that time in 1995 I passed it after having undergone courses in Hammersmith hospital and in Cardiff that is how I became a dermatopathologist and there after I started teaching Dermatopathology for the board residents there by this time I had a moved to Bahrain where I was a consultant and there I met some very good pathologist from PGI Chandigarh and Hyderabad and I started writing the book whenever I took a class I would note down the points and that became the framework for my Dermatopathology book, which became extremely popular subsequently.



7. How did you develop interest in hair transplantation?

I did a course in local anaesthesia and I was doing vitiligo surgery. Around this time in 2000 one of my relatives in America wanted to undergo the hair transplantation and asked my opinion. I did not know much about it so I said I will read and come back and when I read it and found that major advances had happened follicular hair transplantations had been started to have a major impact so I went all the way to Korea for a training in hair transplantation. FUT technique needed microscopic dissection and my skill in Dermatopathology came in very handy and I had already had sufficient Dermatosurgery background so that's how I became very good in hair transplantation and very soon became a pioneer. In 2003 I came back to India I started both Dermatopathology and hair transplantation.

8. You were President of DASIL, 2019 and Board member of ILDS education committee. Can you share your working with international associations

In 2010,I became president of ACSI by that time we had held some conferences, we had started vitiligo day, we had organised vitiligo conference and at this time we had also released a CD for vitiligo patients, pathology CD for students. I met Dr Micheal Gold who was on the verge of starting a society called DASIL so I interacted with him and joined DASIL and by 2018 I became the president of DASIL probably the only instance where the Indian dermatologist had headed an international society as a president and from then I got elected to ILDS one of the highest bodies in the world for it. Another most important thing in international societies is how you develop contacts how you interact with them and here my confidence in dealing with them made a major difference. Their way of working is slightly different and that is something which you have to learn, the other issue is that you have to keep going to conferences again and again and keep presenting papers and become an expert that is very important you should show that you are expert in a particular area. For example, In DASIL all conferences I conducted the workshops on Hair transplantation so that is how you become known. My suggestion to all young colleagues is first 3-4 years you will have to learn everything try to identify where you are interested and then next 5-10 years you work on it and become an expert and then you will reap the rewards. Becoming an expert takes about 15 years of consistent work in a particular field you can change your years of expertise, you can add, you can move from one to another but it is very important to have a particular expertise in an area extremely important and then association work and its consistent work u need to keep climbing up as a member then as a secretary or a treasurer and then as a vice president or president-elect and then as a President. By 2009-10 IADVL was prominent internationally our conferences are well known and I became the chair of international liaison cell, we had also bid for WCD twice and this liaison cell we established liaison with various societies across the world. We organised World conference of cosmetic dermatology 2017 and World congress of Dermatosurgery 2019 in Goa and this is how you achieve prominence internationally.

9. You are first and only Indian to receive field medal by American society of Dermatology. Please tell us about it.

The field medal was given to me when I was the president of DASIL and at that time I also got appointed as liaison person with the American society of Dermatosurgery. Lawrence field was chairing that and he decided to give that partly because he knew my work and I knew him personally. I had invited him to India he conducted 4 workshops in Delhi, Kolkata, Bengaluru and Mumbai which was webcasted all over India. It became a big hit. This was when I was president of IADVL and I had just finished as president of ACSI.



10. You have got seven orations, including the recent Dr Nagabhushan oration. What does it mean to you sir?

In 2005 or 2006 I got IADVL oration, ACSI oration and then oration from Andhra Pradesh, Assam etc. Orations are a kind of recognition that u get for publications. You have to publish and just presentations are not enough. You should not think that u need some fantastic papers to publish. Your routine things can be published. I have about 140 publications and most of it is done when I was in the private sector and it is not correct to say that in private sector you cannot publish. Dermatology is one speciality which is more active in private sector. Our clinics have more facilities than any medical college. Our documentation is better than any medical college so it is possible to publish and get rewards.

11. You have more than 140 publications, author of 4 books and wrote 11 chapters in different dermatology books. It is rare to see success in both private practice and academics. How could you balance both sir?

Writing is a form of teaching and for some reason I never got a full-time appointment in a medical college and when i was in abroad, I was a part time faculty attachment so I had to teach and teaching is through various forms-CDs, books, webinars, podcasts. so I used all these to communicate to people and book was part of that effort. My Dermatopathology book was the first one became extremely popular, then ACSI Dermatosurgery book and then the other books such as practice management, clinical dermatology, medicolegal aspects, online dermatology so it went from one book to another. I am pretty good and fast at writing so it's come somewhat naturally to me.

12. What is your say on service and ethical practice to our young dermatologist?

Ethics I think is one of the most important things for a doctor. Ours is a profession. The difference between profession and business is profession has ethics and ours is noble profession because in addition to ethics it has service, which is the Moto. We help people and our reward is patient satisfaction so the end product of our profession is patient satisfaction. Money is a bi-product. It should never become the end product then it will become a business and loose our name and identity.

13. Can you tell us about Shraddha Clinic, which is done for the poor patients?

I started Shraddha clinic for poor patients keeping service as main moto. I had seen it in Dr Bhel's clinic. We run the clinic every day. There is a board outside the clinic and it is deeply appreciated by patients. So, compassion is one of the biggest plus points of our practice and patients will become impressed by it. It is also therefore a good marketing tool.

14. Who is your inspiration sir?

I can perhaps say that Dr P N Bhel was an inspiration to me. He was a legend doyen and a gaint of a dermatologist, in multiple fields- Dermatologist, Dermatosurgeon, administrator, innovator, entrepreneur, community worker etc. and I can say that he was a model. I got inspired by him and that is how I always dreamt of having a large institute.



15. Tell us about your family. How do you balance work and family life sir?

I have a son and a daughter. Son is a plastic surgeon; daughter-in-law is an ENT surgeon and a granddaughter. Daughter is masters in creative writing and wife is a Gynaecologist who does liposuction also. It is very important to have a good family and work balance. If in dermatology if somebody cannot find balance then that is not acceptable. Everybody has to understand that joy inside the house is as good as money and reputation from outside the house. Any amount of money, any amount of reputation cannot buy, cannot compensate the unhappiness at home.

16. Which was your best conference sir

This is difficult to answer. Every conference you learn something every conference you get something there is nothing like best conference. One of the conferences which we organised I left very happy was the World Conference of Cosmetic Dermatology, World Congress of Dermatosurgery in Goa. Both were very difficult conferences to organise. In terms of impact international society hair restoration surgeons ISHRS meeting in Chicago the first one I had attended made a major difference along with similar meeting in Orlando. But there is no such thing as a best conference.

17. Advice to young dermatologist who look up to you sir?

Achieve expertise but keep learning, change is inevitable but you have to adopt. The way to be fit in medical profession is to learn. The way to be continuously successful is to adopt. Medical practice is a marathon, it is not a 100 meters race so u have to be prepared for a long. Do not look for shortcuts. Money is a bi-product don't make it end product. Find balance between home and work. Ours is a unique profession where u can find joy in work and at the same time u can give joy to other people so find your joy and also give joy.

18. As a senior Dermatologist and experienced person if you get any problem in life, professional or non-professional what is the first step you think and do sir?

The most important way to handle issues is to find a solution. If it is a professional issue usually, I can find an answer by either contemplating about it or reading about it or in some cases consulting somebody who is more of an expert than me. Important is that you need to have time for this and the way to have the time is that you do your routine things efficiently if u become efficient in handling routine things, then you will have time to do the difficult things. And to do the routine things efficiently the trick is delegation. so, I have a team where in there are counsellors, fellows and other people so routine professional issues like taking a detailed history, documenting it, photography, explaining about the cost of the treatment, procedures, explaining prescriptions are done by them. I do only what I have to do which is diagnosis and treatment. I use very efficient EMR to save time, technology if you use it well efficiency increases. so, doctors have to become tech savvy and of course when there is a difficult issue u should have the time to gather knowledge that is through reading, fellows, juniors or through other experts and here we should not have any shame in asking and taking opinions whether it is dermatology speciality or outside speciality.

The same principle applies to non-professional issues also for example we are building a hospital project where there are multiple things involved or there are administrative issues, human resources issues or labour issues whatever the most important thing for all that is to know somebody who can ask so one thing doctor should do is to have a network to establish contacts. we get a lot of patients but we don't find out about where they are working, what is their expertise



and then we don't have the storage of those contacts. If we should find a way to do it so when needed they can tap that and this is where I would say that doctors should not become isolated in a cocoon in an island of our own.

We should mix with non-medical people and always have somebody else to talk. I do Sudarshana kriya whenever there is a stressful situation and I usually become comfortable after that.

19. What is the best moment of your life related to dermatology?

There were several best moments certainly one of the best moments was when I passed my Dermatopathology exam from Royal college of pathology. It was a very tough exam needed huge effort. Another best moment was when a hair transplant patient wrote," Doc, every day when I see myself in the mirror, I remember you because he had such wonderful results. Another best moment was when somebody personally called from Canada, student, to tell me that he had read my Dermatopathology book from his library and it is one of the best books that he had read. Another best moment was when I got elected to ILDS again because it was a huge achievement. There had been other moments when patients have thanked, when juniors have thanked and at this stage of the carrier the best moment is when one of my students does well, when my patients get better.

20. What keep your energy levels high throughout the day?

Medical Profession is one of the few jobs where your passion and profession are one we are very lucky to be in this profession so if your profession is your passion then you don't work you just become yourself and being yourself is never very tiring and so you don't get tired and fortunately I do multiple things in the course of a day clinician, administrator, teacher, surgeon and pathologist and in addition I have time for my family, my reading, my dog and my tennis. I always believe a doctor is a home to multiple parts doctors has to be a clinician, he has to be a teacher, he has to be an entrepreneur, he has to be an innovator, he has to be a family man, he has to be a community person, he has to be an author and of course an administrator. If you are doing these things where else you can find a more varied job, where is the time to get tired.

21. At the end of the interview do you want to share anything sir?

I am an outsider to Bangalore in 2003 when I returned to India. I am grateful to BDS and all its members for accepting me and giving the opportunities, which served as a launch pad. Dr. Venkataram Mysore - As a Medical Officer in Indian Airforce





An emotional tribute to all that is good and great in Indian Air Force and Army Medical Core - by an UNLIKELY AND ACCIDENTAL Flight Lieutenant

- Dr Venkataram Mysore

This is a tribute to Army Medical Core (AMC), through reminiscences of my, an accidental entrant in to armed forces – of my journey during short service commission and subsequently beyond – how IAF encouraged, nurtured, taught and influenced me with lessons in and of life which later helped me to reach the top of my profession as a dermatologist, administrator, leader, enterpreuner.

It was October 1980- that five of us mmcites (Mysore Medical College) travelled by train to Delhi for an interview for AMC- with very little idea of joining Armed forces, more with the idea of enjoying a free trip. But come 1981 april, I received an offer that I could not refuse-I was posted at Air force station Jalahalli, Bangalore!!!! And soon enough, I had done the unthinkable- jettisoning my desire for postgraduation and with some tribulation, I had joined IAF!! And in june we were on our way in the gruelling summer to MOBC 70 at Lucknow. While the physical training was tough, the comradery and the course was thoroughly enjoyable. I returned to AF station Jalahalli and with in a month was pitchforked to face an inspection by DMS AIR as medical stores in charge and food in charge. I was at that time perplexed why I had to do these, but would realize their value later. Soon, I would submerge in to seeing trainees, over 150 a day on parade days, half of whom were scrounging to avoid the parade with trivial and imaginary complaints. I was trying to diagnose and identify healthy people!! Frustrating, but an experience indeed. This coupled with my sense of disappointment at having not gotten in to postgraduation, made me read-read every thing that was in library and for MNAMS part 1. Officers mess at that time in Bangalore was a non fan station and I had delightful company of officers, young and old.

And then disaster stuck – my father suffered a series of health issues and it was very clear to me, being the only son, permanent commission was not an option. And a chance temporary posting to Air force selection board Mysore, opened up and showed me a very kind and considerate face of IAF. I put up an application for a compassionate posting to Mysore, where there was a vacancy and a pressing need for a medical officer. Pushed from the selection board by Gp Capt Vardon and pulled from wg cdr Verma in Air Head Quarters, soon I got posted to Mysore!!

And what a stay it proved to be-helped by a benevolent and kind president Gp Capt Vardon, I soon joined postgraduation in dermatology at Mysore medical college, doing concurrent duties in selection board. My subsequent president, Gp Capt Rehman who was a task master, prepared me and pushed me to work hard, be diligent. And Air Commodore Dhavan then assigned me secondary duties- welfare, Airmens' mess, sports, AFWA, poultry, canteen etc. Mysore being a tourist place, was frequently inspected by many senior officers(including Former Chief , Air chief Marshal Arjun Singh) and I was assigned to be the liason officer. Though these were alien to the thinking of a doctor, I became an officer first and then a doctor, but thoroughly enjoyed them. I can say with out hesitation that this sojourn with primary duty of a medical officer,



concurrent work of a post duration and the host of secondary duties, proved the most influential phase of my life- teaching me the ability to multitask, handle challenges, communicate with seniors, and provide me with immense confidence in self – and they have proven in great stead through out my life and shaped me in to what I became. I can say without hesitation and with a ton of gratitude, I am what I am because of this experience.

But, soon came the end of my SSC and I left, with a touch of sadness and heavy heart-but with confidence and hope. What was followed was a series of efforts-further postgraduation, training and work- in private practice and abroad for 13 years until 2003 when I came back to India. I had by now become the first dermato pathologist (Royal College of pathologists London) and a pioneer in Hair transplantation from India and soon established a major advanced dermatology center in Bangalore which became the first private center to be accredited to Rajeev Gandhi university of health sciences for postdoctoral fellowship in aesthetic dermatology

Those were the days when a renaissance was brooming in dermatology and IADVL was part of it. There was a new spirit of innovation, expansion and intervention; a revolution in procedural dermatology was sweeping across countries and there was a wave of dermatologists becoming dermatosurgeons. I climbed up the ladder in different societies- Association of cutaneus Surgeons of India, Association of Hair restoration surgeons India and Indian association of dermatologists, venereologists and leprologists – to become their president with in ten years. Major writing and publishing followed an editor in chief of Journal of cuatneus and aesthetic surgery, and as many as 7 text books, and books for patient communication. We organized several conferences. What distinguished my effort was speedy and timely execution and completion of the projects, and reforming the administration in these societies- all due to my stint in IAF. This to date remains one of my most satisfying contributions as it has helped a generation of dermatologists and paved the way for more works in the coming years.

It was also time for me to go global- I soon became president of DASIL- Dermatologists and aesthetic International league, a global organization, the first one from India to do so. We organized two world congresses in India. Positions in other societies such as International academy of cosmetic dermatology, International society for hair restoration surgery followed. I then entered International league of dermatological societies as a director which I continue to be-surely the pinnacle for a dermatologist. Orations awards have followed and I now enjoy a most satisfying career as the head of a large dermatology and plastic surgery center in Bangalore which has employed over 40 people, including 5 dermatologists, and trained hundreds from across the globe. The center also runs a charity clinic Shraddha for poor patients.

This then, is an account of a journey- of a young doctor who entered IAF on a whim, but grew and developed in to a global leader in dermatology. All because I ADVL prepared me for my life and imbibed with a spirit - Go, do any thing, but do it! Do it one time and do it well!! Do it for common good and betterment of all!!!!










The Un-Approved love story of **TOFACITINIB** and **DERMATOLOGY.**

Tofacitinib is an immunomodulator of Janus kinase inhibitor (Jakinib) family. It blocks tyrosine kinases of the Janus family.[1] Janus kinase-signal transducer and activator of transcription (JAK/STAT) is an intracellular pathway that drives downstream signalling of several proinflammatory pathways. Many inflammatory dermatoses are triggered by inflammatory mediators which rely on JAK-STAT signalling, and inhibition of this pathway using JAK inhibitors becomes a useful therapeutic strategy in these diseases.[2]

Tofacitinib is a JAK inhibitor



Cytokine binding to its cell surface receptor leads to receptor polymerization

Tofacitinib inhibits the phosphorylation and activation of JAKs

JAKs cannot phosphorylate the cytokine receptors.
Therefore, the receptors cannot dock STATs

Since the STATs cannot dock.

they are not phosphorylated or

activated. Gene transcription

and cytokine production are

thereby inhibited

As tofacitinib inhibits signalling from multiple cytokines and has no reported potential of generating neutralizing antibodies and has easy oral and topical routes of administration, it is being preferred over a biological. Tofacitinib was the first FDA-approved JAK inhibitor for treatment of an autoimmune disease.

Oral as well as topical tofacitinib has been evaluated and is being used as an off-label medication in various dermatoses as mentioned in Table 1.

Tofacitinib is well tolerated in therapeutic doses and has a favourable side effect profile as listed in Table no. 2.

Table.2: Adverse effects noted with oral tofacitinib:

Common adverse events [22]

Upper respiratory tract infections (URTIs),

Nasopharyngitis,

Diarrhoea,

Hypertension,

Urinary tract infection and

dyslipidaemia.

Serious adverse effects: Reactivation of various latent infections such as tuberculosis and herpes zoster and likelihood of opportunistic infections such as candidiasis. [22]



Increase in total cholesterol, low-density lipoprotein (LDL) and high-density lipoprotein (HDL); with no associated risk of any major cardiac event. [23]

The most common adverse effects seen with topical therapy were erythema, hyperpigmentation, transient acne, and minor and reversible laboratory abnormalities.[19]Immunization for varicella is recommended before initiating tofacitinib therapy based on certain studies.[23]

The baseline investigations one must consider before starting oral tofacitinib include complete blood count, liver function test, serum creatinine, fasting lipid profile, hepatitis B and C panel, HIV serology, mantoux test or IFN- gamma release assay such as Quantiferon-TB Gold test. At 1 month follow up and then every 3 months one must include complete blood counts, liver function test and fasting lipid profile. Tuberculosis evaluation can be done annually when on long term tofacitinib therapy. [23]

Monitoring Tofacitinib Treatment

Complete Blood Count	1 month & then every 3 months
Liver Function Test	1 month & then every 3 months
Lipid Profile	1 month & then every 3 months
Tuberculosis Evaluation	Annually

Tofacitinib therapy should not be initiated or must be stopped in case of an active infection be systemic or localised. Dosage reduction should be advised in moderate to severe renal impairment and in moderate hepatic impairment. Use of live vaccinations concurrently with tofacitinib is not recommended and should be administered 4 weeks preferably before initiating tofacitinib therapy.[23]

Tofacitinib has emerged as a valuable off-label treatment option in dermatology, demonstrating efficacy across a range of skin conditions. It's favourable safety profile and convenient oral administration have contributed to its growing popularity among clinicians and patients alike. Despite these advantages, it is crucial to acknowledge that the full spectrum of tofacitinib's benefits and long-term adverse effects is still not entirely understood. Ongoing and future studies will be essential to elucidate these aspects further, ensuring that its use in dermatology is both safe and effective in the long term. As research progresses, tofacitinib may become an even more integral component of dermatological therapy, provided that its long-term safety and efficacy are well-established.



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
